Claude George **Bowes-Lyon**, 14th Earl of Strathmore and Kinghorne was born on 14 March 1855 at **Lowndes Square, Belgravia, London, England**.<sup>1</sup> He was the son of **Claude Bowes-Lyon, 13th Earl of Strathmore and Kinghorne** and **Frances Dora Smith**.<sup>3</sup> He married **Nina Cecilie Cavendish-Bentinck**, daughter of **Reverend Charles William Frederick Cavendish-Bentinck** and **Caroline Louisa Burnaby**, on 16 July 1881 at **Petersham, London, England**.<sup>3</sup> He died on 7 November 1944 at age 89 at **Glamis, Angus, Scotland**.<sup>1</sup> He was buried on 10 November 1944 at **Glamis, Angus, Scotland**.<sup>1</sup>

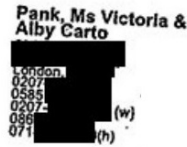

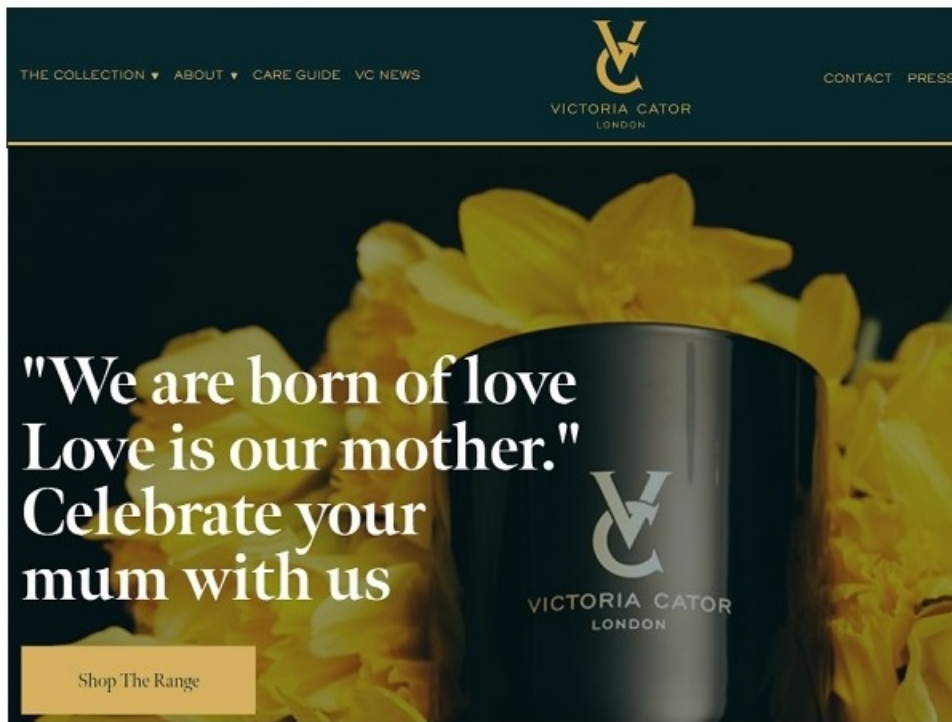

### Major Gen David Pank

Witnessed a volatile period in the history of Northern Ireland

16 Feb 2016

MAJOR GENERAL DAVID PANK, who has died aged 80, was Commander Land Forces Northern Ireland from 1983 to 1985, a turbulent and challenging period.

In September 1983, Pank assumed command. A few days into his tour, there was a mass breakout from the Maze Prison. Of the 38 Provisional IRA prisoners who escaped, 19 were quickly recaptured but many others returned to active service.

During his command, there were more than 500 shooting incidents and 360 bomb attacks. More than four tons of explosives and almost 300 weapons were recovered and there were 690 convictions for terrorist offences.

John Davis Graham Pank was born

at Amersham, Buckinghamshire, on May 2 1935 and educated at Uppingham. In 1958, he enlisted in the Army as a National Serviceman and passed out top of his intake from Mons Officer Cadet School. He was commissioned in the King's Shropshire Light Infantry (KSLI) that same year and joined the 1st Battalion at Colchester.

He served with 1 KSLI in Münster (BAOR) as adjutant and then as a rifle company commander after the battalion was posted back to Plymouth. This period included a deployment to British Honduras for some tough jungle training in the wake of Hurricane Hattie and hot pursuit of a bandit with the striking name of Candelario Gonzalez.

In 1965 he was appointed GSO3 Ops at HQ 99 Gurkha Infantry Brigade

and saw operational service in Borneo during the Confrontation with the Indonesian Army. He was mentioned in despatches.

A return to 1KSLI, then based in Singapore and Malaysia, followed by attendance at the Staff College, led to his selection as brigade major of 24 Airportable Brigade at Plymouth.

His appointment coincided with the outbreak of sectarian violence in Northern Ireland in 1969 and resulted in two emergency deployments to the province to assist with the rapidly deteriorating security situation.

Following a posting as company commander with 3 Battalion Light Infantry (3 LI) at Plymouth and then at Minden (BAOR), he served

on the directing staff at the Staff College, Camberley. In August 1974, he assumed command of 3LI at Minden from where they deployed on an emergency operational tour of duty in Londonderry. After a posting to the School of Infantry (Warminster) as chief instructor followed by an appointment as Assistant Director Defence Policy at the MOD, in 1979 he assumed command of 33 Armoured Brigade at Paderborn (BAOR).

In 1985 he became the Director General of Personnel Services (Army) at the MOD. This was a most exacting appointment at a time of great economic stringency in which he battled to maintain and enhance service conditions and the quality of life of soldiers and their families.

His final appointment in 1989 was Director of Infantry. From 1987 to 1990 he also gave sterling service to the Regiment as Colonel The Light Infantry. In 1989, he was appointed CB.

Pank was a keen sportsman throughout his Army career. As a younger man, he was a successful sprinter and high-jumper. He was also a competitive rugby, hockey, tennis and squash player and an accomplished cricketer.

He also had a lifelong love of horses. He was chief executive of Newbury Racecourse from 1990 to 1998, and director of the Racecourse Association from 1994 to 1998.

A man of unwavering integrity, Pank had considerable charm and a great sense of humour. He also had high standards of professionalism.

David Pank married first, in 1963, Julia Matheson who predeceased him. He married secondly, in 2003, Jill Bevan (née Murrell) who survives him with two sons and daughter from his first marriage. David Pank, born May 2 1935, died January 26 2016

When Thierry Magon de la Villehuchet committed suicide just before Christmas, I hoped against hope that others would do the same. No such luck. Villehuchet was an aristocrat, a gentleman and an honest man. He felt responsible for the loss of \$1.4 billion and he took the honourable way out. I did not know Villehuchet but people who did have spoken very highly of him. The rest of Madoff's gang I do know, and they are as likely to do the honourable thing as I am to emigrate to Israel.

Most of these friends of Madoff own chalets in Gstaad, or visit regularly. I have warned personnel at the Gstaad Palace, the Yacht Club and the Eagle Club that if I come across any of them there will be fisticuffs. Not that any of them would fight. People like that rarely do. The reason I'm so angry is that so many good people have been ruined by the greed of a few 'feeder' fund managers and so-called bankers. I will start with one Michael de Picciotto. His uncle, Edgar de Picciotto, is the founder and chairman of Union Bancaire Privée, a Geneva-based bank that invested client money with Madoff. The Picciottos are Syrian-Lebanese Jews who have become extremely rich these past 20 years. Somewhere along the way they picked up the aristocratic 'de', that being the only similarity any Picciotto has had with anything resembling aristocracy. The younger Picciotto invested \$700 million with Madoff. Didn't the amazing return on Madoff's fund ring any alarm bells in Picciotto's head? What needs to be done now is for the UBP to cough up the moolah to the clients it took down the Swanee. The bank has the money—at the last count the UBP had 125 billion greenbacks under management—but parting with it is a different story altogether. Angry investors are now seeking to recover a portion of their funds, but what I'd like to know is why only a portion. The Picciottos are now deeply involved in damage control. They have myriad lawyers and PR flacks, and as I write I hear that Edgar Picciotto is planning to come up to Gstaad. Although he is old and very ugly, a punch in the face would do him a world of good.

Created as a key component of the Moross Integrated Cancer Center (MICC), the de Picciotto- Lesser Cancer Cell Observatory in Memory of Wolfgang and Ruth Lesser, established by Michael de Picciotto, offers scientists in-depth analysis of cancer cells using advanced imaging technologies, which enables viewing live cells in action and at high optical resolutions.

Michael de Picciotto grew up in Brussels and splits his time between London and Switzerland, where he lives with his wife and two daughters. In 1933, barely 20 years old, they fled Nazi Germany to Amsterdam; their own parents followed after the Kristallnacht in November 1938, when Michael's mother was born. They survived deportation to Bergen Belsen and lived in Amsterdam until moving to Jerusalem in the 1980s. "My grandfather, a successful businessman, was a very generous and charitable person with whom I had an extremely close bond. He was also a great supporter of Israel." Wolfgang Lesser passed away in Jerusalem, in 1995, from pancreatic cancer.

"My contribution to the Cancer Cell Observatory allows me to honor my beloved grandparents, and express my attachment to my roots and my fascination with science," says Michael de Picciotto, whose father is an engineer—as were his two uncles—and who also has a PhD in organic chemistry from Geneva University.

"Science is the dominant field of excellence in Israel, and the Weizmann Institute is one of its most successful 'engines'. Globally, and in particular over the past 100 years, science has greatly benefited from many important Jewish scientists and represents an impressive contribution by our 'nation' to mankind," he continues. "I am eager to follow and observe the future results of the research done within the Observatory and am grateful to be able to associate my grandparents' memory and that of my family with this exciting new area at the Weizmann Institute."

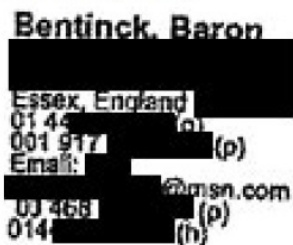

The **Bentinck family** is a prominent family belonging to [Dutch](#), [German](#) and [British nobility](#). Its members have served in the armed forces and as ambassadors and politicians, including as [Governor General of India](#) and as [Prime Minister of the United Kingdom](#). The family is related to the [British royal family](#) through the maternal [Cavendish-Bentinck](#) line of [Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother](#).

## History [[edit](#)]

The name Bentinck is a [patronymic](#) variation of the [Old Germanic](#) name Bento. The family is originally from the east of the [Netherlands](#) and is regarded as *Uradel* nobility, or noble from earliest times. The oldest known ancestor is Johan Bentinck, who owned land near [Heerde](#) and is mentioned in documents between 1343 and 1386.

An important British branch was founded by [Hans Willem Bentinck, 1st Earl of Portland](#), who accompanied [William Henry, Prince of Orange](#) to England during the [Glorious Revolution](#). The head of this line was initially given the title of [Earl of Portland](#) (later [Duke of Portland](#)).

In 1732, the title of [Count Bentinck](#) (*Graf Bentinck*), of the [Holy Roman Empire](#), was created for [Willem Bentinck](#), the second surviving son of the 1st Earl of Portland. A Royal Licence of 1886 was created which allowed the use of this title in Britain. The Royal Warrant of 27 April 1932 abolished the use of foreign titles in the United Kingdom but extended the special allowance in 13 cases, including the Bentinck comital title "during the lives of the present holders, their heirs, and their heir's heir, provided such heir's heir is now in existence." That exception has now expired.<sup>[1]</sup> Another branch with the title of count existed in the Netherlands, but it died out in the male line.

The Dutch and British branches of the family continue to exist and belong to the [Dutch nobility](#), [German nobility](#) and [British nobility](#).

The counts of Bentinck were sovereign rulers of the Lordship of In- and Kniphausen, a territory of two parts in and around what is now the city of [Wilhelmshaven](#). Originally subject to [Brussels](#), the general reorganisation of the Holy Empire in 1803 (*Reichsdeputationshauptschluss*) granted [Imperial immediacy](#) until the dissolution of the Holy Empire in 1806. The Lordship maintained a precarious independence until 1810, when [France](#) annexed it and the whole German [North Sea](#) coast to enforce the [Continental System](#). At the [Congress of Vienna](#) in 1815, the Lordship was denied admittance to the [German Confederation](#) in deference to [Tsar Alexander I](#), who wished to see the territory annexed by his cousin, the [Grand Duke of Oldenburg](#). Count Bentinck fought for his little state, however, and at the [Congress of Aix-la-Chapelle](#) in 1818, the Great Powers agreed that the Count's territory should be granted limited sovereignty.

The Frankfurt Convention of 10 July 1819 recognised In- and Kniphausen as sovereign within its own borders but under the protection of Oldenburg.<sup>[2]</sup> The Treaty of Berlin on 8 June 1825 finalized the terms. In- and Kniphausen was permitted its own commercial flag, which its vessels bore on the high seas.<sup>[3]</sup> Nevertheless, there was a long dispute between the Oldenburg and the Bentinck families in the latter's inheritance. This dispute was not ended until 1854 with a settlement in which the Bentinck family renounced its sovereignty for financial compensation and certain property rights. The Counts of Bentinck no longer claimed sovereignty over In- and Kniphausen.

Even before the final settlement, Oldenburg and Prussia had negotiated the [Treaty of Jade](#) of 1853 in which Oldenburg agreed to sell 340 hectares of Kniphausen territory to Prussia as a naval station for its North Sea Fleet. The cession became the city of Wilhelmshaven.

The Dutch estate of the Bentinck family since the 16th century, [Schoonheten House](#) <sup>[nl]</sup>, is situated between the villages [Heeten](#) and [Raalte](#) in [Overijssel](#). The area contains 5 km<sup>2</sup> (1.9 sq mi) of forests and cultivated land. Today the family mainly earns its living by forestry, agriculture and renting holiday houses. The British branch of the family owns [Bothal Castle](#) (Bothal Estates) in Northumberland and [Welbeck Abbey](#) (Welbeck Estates), the ancestral seat of the [Dukes of Portland](#) in Nottinghamshire. Gary Ramsay Bentinck, Baron Bentinck (1964), is head of both the British baronial branch and [the Dutch family](#).<sup>[4]</sup> At the moment, there are not so many of the Dutch Bentincks bearing this surname and belonging to the branch of the original family, such as Maxim (baptismal name Maxim Wilhelm Christian Fredrik) Bentinck and Anna Bentinck, direct descendants who are aristocrats.

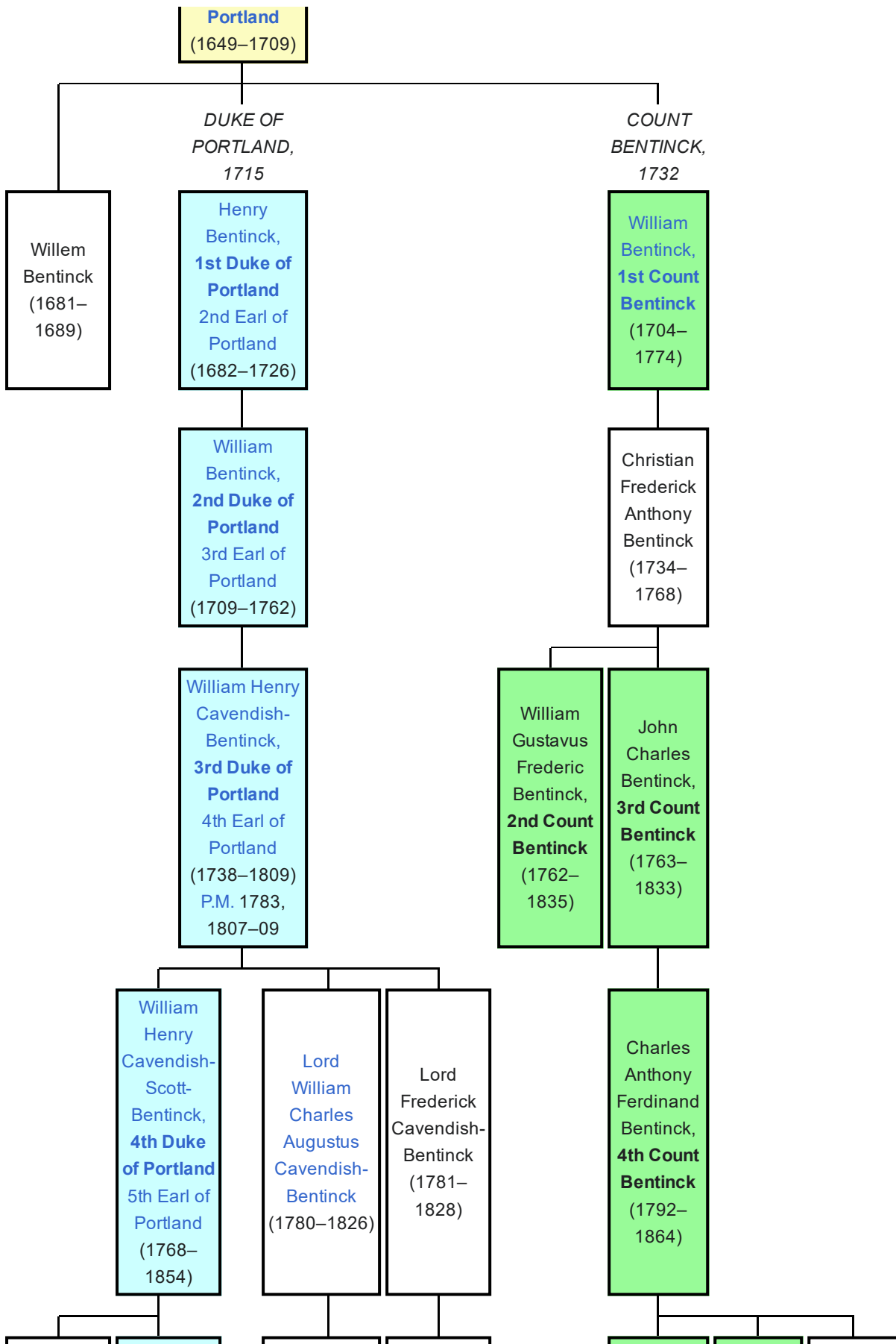

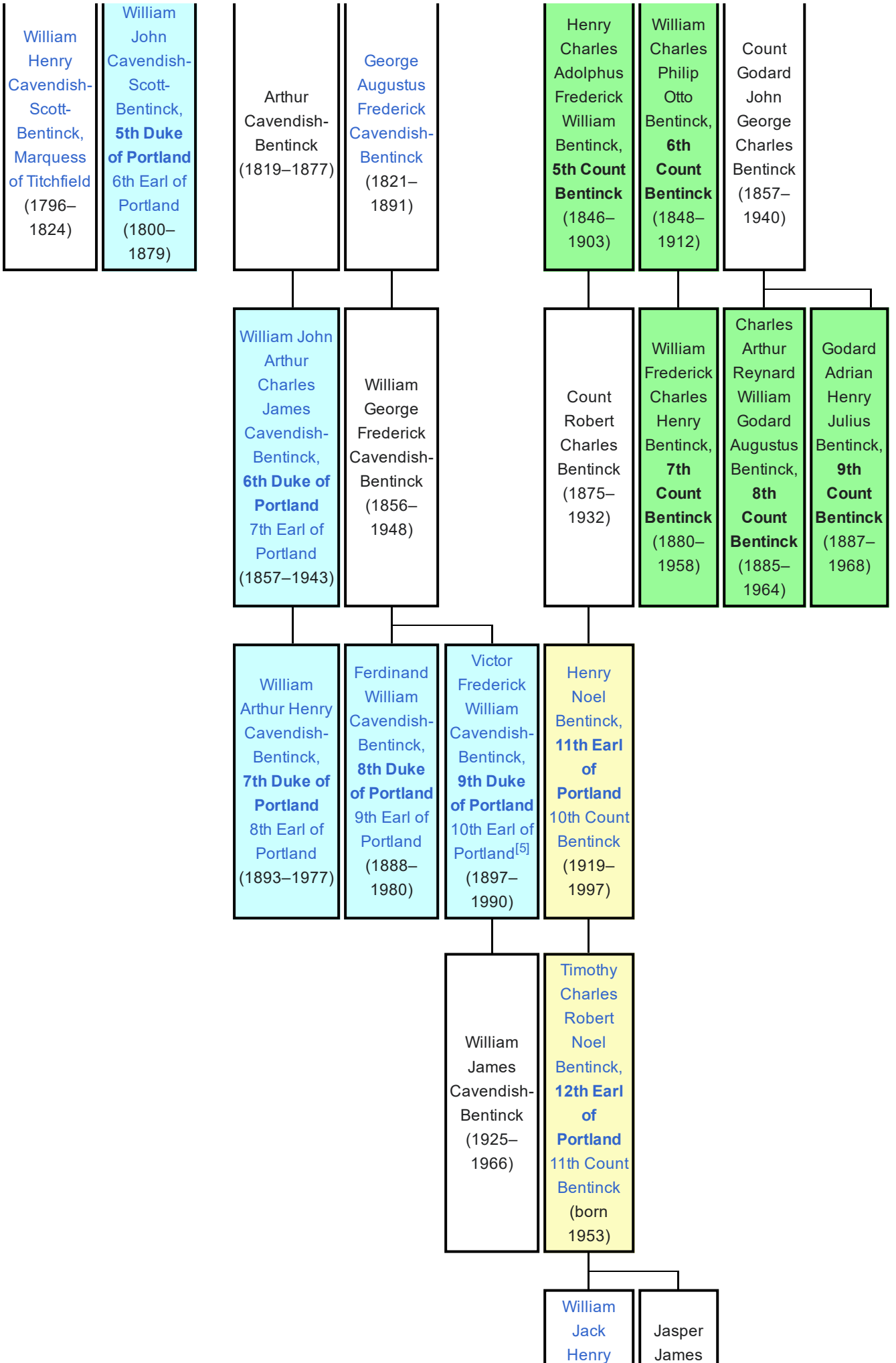

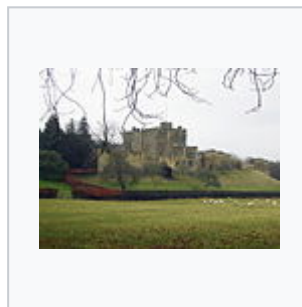
- [Bentinck Island](#) near [Victoria, British Columbia](#) at 48°18′54.08″N 123°32′30.32″W﻿ / ﻿48.314744°N 123.541922°W﻿ / 48.314744; -123.541922 may have been named after [Lord George Bentinck](#).<sup>[6]</sup>
- [North](#) and [South Bentinck Arms](#), inlets off [Burke Channel](#), were named after [William Cavendish-Bentinck](#), 3rd Duke of Portland by [Captain Vancouver](#) in 1793.<sup>[7]:48</sup> [North Bentinck Arm](#) is significant in the history of Canada because it was here in 1793 that [Sir Alexander Mackenzie](#) completed the first recorded transcontinental crossing of North America by a European north of Mexico.
- [HMS \*Bentinck\*](#), Royal Navy ships named after Captain [John Bentinck](#).
- After [Kaiser Wilhelm II](#) fled to the [Netherlands](#) at the end of [World War I](#), he was housed at [Amerongen Castle](#), belonging to Count Bentinck.
- [HMS \*Portland\* \(F79\)](#) is a [type 23 frigate](#) (*Duke* class) named after the Dukes of Portland. It is the eighth ship to hold the title, but the first to be named after the Portland family, rather than [Portland Harbour](#).<sup>[*verification needed*]</sup>
- Bentinck Street and Bentinck School, in the [Radford](#) area of Nottingham, bear the family name. [John Bentinck](#), 5th Duke of Portland lived at [Welbeck Abbey](#) near [Clumber Park](#) in North [Nottinghamshire](#).
- Bentinck Street, near Cavendish Square in the West End of London, bears the family name.
- [Bentinckia](#), a genus of palms named after Lord William Bentinck, Governor General of British India.
